It's been a busy fall at Virden Operations. We had 5 Reclamation Crews working for Tundra for most of Summer and Fall. We worked for Corex at 4 different locations for spill clean-up and pipeline projects. We started plowing for Corex in November and installed over 5000 Meters of Flex Pipe for them. James has been out doing cut and cap abandonments for Tundra. We've had 2 crews out all season for Enbridge completing right of way cleanups, right of way maintenance, seeding and spraying. Currently, we are working on a pipeline crossing repair for Bannister. We've just started a 5000 yard gravel haul for the RM of Wallace. In January we will start crushing for the RM of Wallace. Our mechanic is continuing to work on the equipment and prep for the winter season in the shop.

Everyone has worked really hard this construction season. We peaked at 60 for manpower and we are hoping to keep that many and more working into the 2019 construction season.

### NLS Office & Shop

It has been a very busy year with NLS complement of workers going up to 30 counting 3 contract welders we used as well as a temporary admin. We have an excellent group with the perfect blend of experience and new guys. The goal is to keep all our new employees working as we continue to grow.

NLS has been very busy with TEML sleeving and the crew came in yesterday for the year. There is 1 dig left that's in the middle of a slough that TEML is going to wait until the area freezes then attempt to dig and sleeve the area.

The guys were road warriors and put in a lot of hours to keep the tight schedule of getting everything done in 2018. There was a total of 68 Integrity digs of varying lengths which NLS was able to complete and now we will be getting the turnover packages ready for turnover.

As NLS grows we require more equipment, tools, vehicles and personal. We have added to our fleet of service trucks as well as our portable welding trucks.

We have also been busy for K+S as they have jobs, they want finished in the 2018 budget year. We will be finishing the mechanical part of one of them with a hydrotest today.

We have 2 guys welding K+S Inconel pipe (Bands) and will be out there for at least 6 months, working ten-hour days, 4 days a week. We also have one of our Pipefitters onsite doing maintenance odds and ends for K+S as they have bumped their own fitter up to a planner temporarily. Our fitter will be on site till the end of January at least. With this we also frequently have a welder who goes out as required.

We are in the final stages of the Odessa Station work for Enbridge and will have the

piping ready for hydro in Early 2019 as we are missing some material.



NLS is in the process of getting our Quality Program recognized in Alberta through ABSA. In early 2019, NLS will be coming to the Red Deer shop to do a mock up job for our ABSA certification.

NLS has gotten our Manitoba Quality Program approved as well as getting our weld procedures approved and accepted in Manitoba this fall.

At the end of October, NLS went through our COR audit and thanks to Randi we were able to get the required grade, so we are good for another 3 years.

We have Lorne and Shawn from GCS in Regina giving our office a face lift of new siding. Steven is working hard bidding mechanical jobs trying to get NLS even more work.

We will be installing A Base to prepare for asphalt and demoing the old bridge next Spring 2019.

# Safety Corner



The right of an individual to work in a healthy and safe environment will always take priority over an individual's right to use an impairing substance which may result in a workplace incident

### **DRUG TESTING**

A drug and alcohol testing cut-off level is the point where the amount of a substance within the body goes from allowable to unallowable.

When a person has more of an impairing substance in their body than the allowable limit, they've exceeded what they can legally have, and can test positive on a drug and alcohol test, regardless of their level of judgement, function, or ability.

If they're under the allowable limit, they'll test negative. By employing cut-off levels, governments and organizations can maintain fairness and promote safety.





INITIAL TESTING CUT-OFF LEVEL

Because everybody reacts slightly differently to impairment-causing conditions and substances, and because their tolerances vary...

...the **cut-off level** concept has been adopted as a way to ensure <u>public</u> and <u>personal</u> **safety**.

# What do you need to know?

WHERE IT COMES FROM: Marijuana is the dried leaves, flowers, stems, and seeds from the Cannabis Sativa or Cannabis Indica plant.

WHAT IT IS CALLED: It is also known as pot, weed, ganja, bud, grass, mary-jane, and other slang terms,

WHAT DOES IT CONTAIN: marijuana contains THC, a mind-altering chemical compound.

Smoking marijuana isn't like smoking tobacco. It doesn't have the same effect.

### Tobacco <u>doesn't</u> cause **impairment**

# How people react to the drug depends on:

## Different uses different effects

Marijuana use has all sorts of effects on your body.

Your body will use or react to the herb differently based on how it is ingested

# Methods of ingestion

SMOKING: When you smoke cannabis, you use heat to create psychoactive THC. Through inhalation it makes it into your bloodstream

EDIBLES: Unlike inhaled cannabis, edible cannabis is metabolized by the liver

OILS: Medical cannabis oil is a highly concentrated cannabis extraction and can be taken orally or vaporized


